## Finding Articles: Recommended Databases

Database	Description
<b>Business Source Complete</b>	Business Source Complete provides indexing for over 2,800 scholarly business journals covering marketing, management, MIS, POM, accounting, finance, economics and more. The database provides indexing of the top scholarly journals dating as far back as 1886, and full text for more than 300 peer-reviewed business publications. This database is updated daily.
<b>CAB Direct 1900-</b>	Over 9,000 journals are scanned for inclusion, as well as books, conferences, reports, and other kinds of literature published internationally with abstracts in English prepared from papers originally published in over 70 different languages. Subjects covered include: animal and crop husbandry, animal and plant breeding, plant protection, genetics, forestry, engineering, economics, veterinary medicine, human nutrition, and rural development. <b>Particularly good for materials from Great Britain, Europe, and Commonwealth Countries.</b>
<b>Dissertation Abstracts 1861-</b>	ProQuest Dissertations and Theses contains more than 2.4 million citations, with abstracts (since 1980) to dissertations accepted for doctoral degrees by accredited North American educational institutions and more than 200 institutions elsewhere. Dissertation Abstracts also contains citations, with abstracts (since 1988), to some masters' theses. Coverage includes approximately 3,000 subject areas, as well as masters theses and some dissertations from Canadian and overseas institutions. <b>Includes free full-text for all dissertations submitted since 1997.</b>
<b>Education Research Complete</b>	Education Research Complete offers the world's largest and most complete collection of full text education journals. Topics covered include all levels of education from early childhood to higher education, and all educational specialties, such as multilingual education, health education, and testing. Education Research Complete provides indexing and abstracts for more than 3,000 journals back to 1881, as well as full text for more than 2,000 journals back to 1936, and includes full text for numerous education-related conference papers and more than 500 books and monographs back to 1972.
<b>ERIC 1966-</b>	An U.S. national bibliographic database covering the journal and research literature in the field of education, educational research, teaching methods and practices, and educational systems. Sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education, ERIC blends two files: Resources in Education (RIE), covering the fugitive document literature, and Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), covering the published journal literature from over 775 periodicals. The database also includes the full text of ERIC Digest records.
<b>SocINDEX with full text 1895-</b>	SocINDEX features more than 2,066,400 records, including full text for 777 journals dating back to 1908. This database also includes full text for more than 820 books and monographs, and full text for 13,947 conference papers.
<b>Web of Knowledge: Journal Citation Reports 1998-previous year</b>	Provides easy access to data that helps you evaluate and compare scholarly journals. Includes virtually all specialties in the areas of science, technology, and social sciences. Using citation data drawn from over 7,500 scholarly and technical journals from more than 3,300 publishers in over 60 countries, the JCR can show you the: highest impact journals, most frequently used journals, hottest journals, largest journals.
<b>Web of Knowledge: Social Sciences Citation Index 1965-</b>	A multi-disciplinary database, with searchable author abstracts, covering the journal literature of the sciences and social sciences. It indexes approximately 7,000 major journals across 214 disciplines. A unique feature of this database is <b>cited reference searching.</b>

## Finding Articles: Other Useful Databases

Database	Description
<b>AGRICOLA</b> 1970-	Contains citations to <b>agricultural</b> literature acquired by the <b>United States National Agricultural Library</b> and cooperating institutions, and subfiles of related subjects, such as food and nutrition, agricultural economics, parasitology, etc., supplied by information centers. Especially good for retrieving <b>USDA, Extension and Experiment Station publications</b> .
<b>AGRIS</b> 1975-	AGRIS is the <b>international</b> information system for the agricultural sciences and technology. It was created by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) in 1974, to facilitate information exchange and to identify world literature dealing with all aspects of agriculture. The system collects bibliographic references to either conventional (journal articles, books) or non-conventional materials (sometimes called " <b>grey literature</b> " e.g. theses, reports, etc.,) not available through commercial channels. One of the main reasons for AGRIS' existence is to encourage the exchange of information among <b>developing countries</b> , whose literature would not be covered by other international systems.
<b>ComAbstracts</b> 1986-	The ComAbstracts database contains abstracts of articles and books published in the primary professional literature of the communication(s) field as well as bibliographic records and audio materials. No other electronic resource on the world wide web provides more comprehensive coverage of the communication discipline's first line scholarship.
<b>Newspaper Source</b>	Newspaper Source provides selected full text coverage for more than 245 newspapers and other sources. This collection includes cover-to-cover full text for USA Today, The Christian Science Monitor and The Times (London) as well as selected full text from more than 180 regional newspapers including: Boston Globe, Detroit Free Press, Houston Chronicle, Miami Herald, San Jose Mercury News, etc. Full text transcripts are also included from Face the Nation, CBS Evening News with Dan Rather, 60 Minutes, O'Reilly Factor, Hannity & Colmes, CNN, CNBC, National Public Radio (NPR), etc.
<b>PAIS</b> 1972-	A selective index with mini-abstracts to economic, political, and social issues. It covers the public and social policy literature of business, economics, finance, law, international relations, public administration, government, political science, and other social sciences. It covers topics that are or might become the subject of legislation. Contains references to journal articles, books, statistical yearbooks, directories, conference proceedings, pamphlets, reports, government documents, and microfiche from all over the world. More than 1,600 journals and over 7,000 monographs are indexed each year.

## Current Awareness Services

To assist you in staying abreast of new publications, most of the databases allow you to set up a user profile and save searches that are relevant to your research topic. The database's service will either automatically send you the citations of recently published articles by e-mail or RSS feed, or will have a procedure to easily re-search your search terms to locate articles published since you last searched the database.

A number of journals, including those in the OhioLINK Electronic Journal Center, also have the current awareness function. You may set up these profiles on your own, or contact an FAES Librarian for assistance.

## Article Express/Interlibrary Services

Article Express provides electronic delivery of journal articles, book chapters, and proceedings papers to OSU faculty, staff, and students. The online Article Express form can be used to request articles from both OSU and non-OSU collections at no cost to you.

Requests from the OSU Collections are usually filled within 3 business days; however, copies obtained from non-OSU collections may take longer. Users will receive an email message with a URL to ILLiad where they can log into their account and view or print the article. Users can access their articles on our server from any computer with internet access, a browser, and Adobe Acrobat reader.

## RefWorks

### Your Online Personal Database and Bibliography Creator

As you work on your research topic, you will identify journal articles, conference presentations, and report literature to which you expect to refer on a regular basis. There are several software packages which help manage the citations to the articles which are important in your research. The Ohio State University Libraries and the Office of Information Technology have made the desktop application RefWorks® available **free of charge** to anyone affiliated with the University.

RefWorks® is a Web-based bibliography and database manager that allows users to create their own personal database by importing references from text files or online databases. You can use these references in writing your papers and automatically format the paper and the bibliography in seconds. RefWorks® allows you to:

- Organize and create a personal database online – no more index cards to write out and organize. Everything is done automatically as you import the reference into RefWorks®.
- Format bibliographies and manuscripts in seconds – this saves hours of typing time and decreases the number of errors in creating tedious bibliographies. Easily make changes to your paper and reformat in seconds.
- Import references from a variety of databases using the already created Import Filters. When you leave OSU, export your data to use with a new RefWorks account or other bibliographic software.
- Searching your RefWorks® database is fast and easy – RefWorks® automatically creates author, descriptor and periodical indexes when importing so you just click on the word to perform the retrieval. Use Quick Search to search all fields for the most comprehensive results or Advanced Search to narrow your search to specific terms and fields.
